39 40 41		 Vitality Falcovitch (9280 SW 167th Terrace) – spoke in support of the proposed budget and millage rate.
42 43 44 45 46 47		 Eugene Flinn (8261 SW 162nd Street) – reported that ARPA funds appear to be using \$1.3 million for recurring funds and questioned where the Village would stand with policing when ARPA money runs out. He also questioned the 2019 mitigating resolution and questioned the possible legal action for canal restoration.

1 2 3 4 5	 Pam Gorman (14140 SW 77th Avenue) – stated that the Village Council has failed to the promises of incorporation over twenty years ago. She also reported that FPL franchise fees are a hidden tax and urged the Council to relief residents from higher taxes.
6 7 8	 Henry Clifford (8875 SW 171st St) – thanked the Council for keeping the milage rate low.
9 10 11 12 13	 Beverly Gerald (14271 SW 74th Court) – spoke in support of franchise fees and the millage rate and explained that it is irresponsible to do away with them. She questioned what the Village will do when ARPA funds run out and spoke in support of resiliency change and urged the Council to look further into the future.
14 15	COUNCIL DISCUSSION/QUESTIONS:
16 17 18 19	Councilmember Steve Cody and Vice Mayor Leanne Tellam spoke in support of the proposed millage rate.
20 21 22 23	Councilmember Marsha Matson urged the Council to consider going back to the roll back rate (same amount as the prior year) due to inflation being high.
23 24 25 26 27	Councilmember Marsha Matson motioned to have millage rate at the same amount of money as last year. Councilmember Patrick Fiore seconded the motion.
28 29 30 31 32	Councilmember Patrick Fiore spoke in support of the roll back rate and opposed to loosing police officers from the budget. He urged the Council to support the addition of a volleyball court at Coral Reef Park and the reduction of the funds allocated for studies such as the comprehensive plan in the amount of \$50,000.
33 34 35 36 37	The question was called on the motion and the motion failed (2-3); Mayor Karyn Cunningham, Vice Mayor Leanne Tellam, and Councilmember Steve Cody voting in opposition.
38 39 40	Councilmember Patrick Fiore motioned to lower the millage rate to 2.3 mills. The motion was seconded by Councilmember Marsha Matson.
41 42 43 44	Councilmember Steve Cody reported that lowering the millage rate to 2.3 is an equivalent of a savings in the amount of \$170,000 and would entail removing the two studies from the budget (comprehensive plan and economic market study).
45 46 47 48	Manager Marano reported that the Comprehensive Plan will cost approximately \$100,000 and that it is a requirement by Florida Statutes for the Village to get it done. He spoke opposed to lowering the millage

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1 rate to 2.3 and urged the Council to not support it due to the expected 2 recession with real estate values that is occurring. He explained that 3 between the 2.3 and 2.35 millage rate, the potential impact is far greater 4 than modest benefit. 5 6 Mayor Karyn Cunningham spoke in support of the proposed 2.35 millage 7 rate and thanked the Village Manager for considering lowering the millage rate below 2.4 (the maximum mileage rate). She also spoke in 8 support of setting aside \$50,000 for the maintenance fund in the budget; 9 10 as she explained, setting aside these types of funds was not done in previous years by the prior Administration. 11 12 13 Councilmember Patrick Fiore questioned if the Comprehensive Plan 14 must be done by Florida Statute. 15 16 Manager Marano responded yes. 17 18 Councilmember Patrick Fiore withdrew his motion. No objections were received from the Council on the withdrawal of the motion. The following in-person public comments were heard for item 4B:

1 2 Vitality Falcovitch (9280 SW 167th Terrace) – spoke in support of the 3 proposed budget. 4 5 Eugene Flinn (8261 SW 162nd Street) – stated that a significant amount of money could be cut from the budget, including the items 6 that aren't discussed during the budget hearing. He spoke opposed 7 8 to cutting public safety and park fees. He urged the Council to spend 9 monies on the woods and questioned what the Village's plan is 10 considering that the lease is coming to an end. He spoke in support of the volleyball courts at Coral Reef Park and the proposal of adding 11 12 additional picnic tables around the park. 13 14 Henry Clifford (8875 SW 171st St) – spoke in support of the Coral Reef Park pineland and guestioned what the Village's plan is for the 15 16 pineland restoration area. He urged the Council to support the hiring 17 of an arborist and questioned the woods project. 18 19 Following public comments, Manager Marano continued his Budget 20 Presentation by demonstrating a PowerPoint that illustrated the proposed 21 staffing summary for each of the Village Departments, capital and maintenance budget highlights, park impact fee highlights, CITT transportation highlights, 22 23 stormwater budget highlights, ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act) highlights, 24 Building Highlights, and Veterans' Park highlights. 25 26 COUNCIL DISCUSSION/QUESTIONS: 27 28 Councilmember Steve Cody questioned if the funds allocated for the woods 29 project is sufficient to cover the lease with the county. 30 31 Fanny Carmona, Parks and Recreation Director responded yes and that the 32 funds allocated in the budget are sufficient to meet the requirements of Miami-33 Dade County. 34 35 Councilmember Steve Cody questioned the control of the burning and the removal of the oaks. 36 37 38 Director Carmona reported that the Village is working with the county for the 39 control burning, including the removal of the oaks. 40 41 Councilmember Steve Cody questioned if the pavilion next to the meditation garden at Coral Reef Park has been fixed and where the funds for the repair 42 43 would come from. 44 45 Director Carmona reported that the repair is being taken care of and the funds are allocated from the current fiscal year budget. 46 47

1 2	Councilmember Steve Cody questioned the treatment of the softball fields at Palmetto Bay Park and asked for the timeline.
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4	Director Carmona responded that once the grant is approved, the Village will
5	begin the process of the softball fields to ensure that the fields are ready for the
6	tournaments as the schedule will be worked out.
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8	Councilmember Steve Cody asked about the park improvements at the
9	Palmetto Bay Park playground, including the status of the skate park.
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11	Director Carmona responded that the Village has allocated \$500,000 for overall
12	projects which will come from the Parks Master Plan and that the skate park is
13	part of the Parks Master Plan too.
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15	Councilmember Marsha Matson spoke opposed to the way ARPA funds are
16	being used in the proposed budget and that ARPA is intended for water, sewer,
17	and infrastructure projects. She questioned what the Village will do once ARPA
18	funds are terminated from the budget and reported that the proposed budget
19	contains good things such as sub-basin projects and Village tree projects. She
20	spoke in support of making the Village more resilient due to the climate
21	changes and urged the Council to vote in opposition of the proposed budget as
22	presented by the Manager.
23	Councilmonder Marcha Mataon reported that the Village proviously act aside
24 25	Councilmember Marsha Matson reported that the Village previously set aside
25 26	a separate restricted fund for parks acquisition in the amount of \$50,000 the
26 27	previous fiscal year. She questioned where the funds are in the budget now.
28	Manager Marano responded that the funds in the proposed budget includes the
28 29	\$50,000 for parks acquisition. He referenced page 29 of his PowerPoint
30	presentation to demonstrate the budget.
31	presentation to demonstrate the budget.
32	Councilmember Marsha Matson questioned if Palmetto Bay has to match the
33	grant from the state of Florida for the sub-basin improvement projects.
34	grant from the state of Florida for the sub-basin improvement projects.
35	Manager Marano responded yes and that the Village will have to pay, costing
36	approximating \$200,000, in that range.
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38	Councilmember Marsha Matson questioned what the cost per ride for the
39	freebee.
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41	Manager Marano responded that the cost varies by month.
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43	Public Services Director, Dionisio Torres responded that it costs an estimate of
14	\$32,000 a month.
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46	Manager Marano reported that the July 2022 estimate was based on the
1 7	number of rides, costing \$20.87 per ride with the ridership being at 1,533 that
18	month.

1 Councilmember Marsha Matson spoke opposed to the funds being used for 2 freebee due to the low ridership data. 3 4 Councilmember Marsha Matson reported that she supports the Veterans' Park 5 but is concerned that the Village is not receiving a clear title and spoke opposed 6 the amount of funds being allocated to this park without receiving a clear title. 7 8 Attorney John Dellagloria explained that the Village would not be receiving the 9 deed for the Veterans' Park until the plat issue is resolved with South Motors. 10 He reported that the Village does not have the timeframe for when the platting 11 would be concluded and that it could take approximately six months for the 12 county to plat the property. 13 14 Councilmember Marsha Matson reported that unless the Village has a deed 15 that is free and clear, that she would not support a budget allocating funds for 16 the veteran's park. 17 18 Manager Marano reported that the Village would not spend funds on the 19 veteran's park until the plat matter is resolved; however, the funds are being 20 allocated based on the commitment the Village made over six years ago. 21 22 Councilmember Patrick Fiore spoke in support of the sub-basin projects, the 23 water main project for SW 143rd Street, the vac truck, and the Coral Reef Park 24 recreational building. 25 26 Manager Marano reported that the recreational building at Coral Reef Park is 27 fully being funded in the proposed budget and announced that a Parks Master 28 Plan Workshop is scheduled for September 30, 2022, at Palmer Trinity School. 29 He encouraged members of the public to attend the workshop. 30 31 Manager Marano provided an update on the rubberized trails repair project at 32 Coral Reef Park and explained that it would cost approximately \$2.6 million 33 dollars for that project due to the type of work that is involved with repairing the 34 trails as it wasn't property installed when the project was originally done. He 35 explained that he has a meeting with the contractor in the future to discuss 36 going over the options for this project. 37 38 Vice Mayor Leanne Tellam thanked the Village Manager for answering all her 39 questions prior to the budget hearing and thanked him for the presentation. 40 41 Councilmember Marsha Matson questioned if the walking trail at Palmetto Bay 42 Park will be replaced. 43 44 Director Carmona responded that the Request for Proposal process for the 45 walking trails at Palmetto Bay Park recently closed and that a cone of silence 46 is in place. She announced that a recommendation will be brought to the 47 Council in the month of October. 48

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1 Mayor Karyn Cunningham spoke in support of the Manager's presentation and 2 the proposed budget. She announced that the Village has created a legacy for the maintenance fund, resiliency plan, and the veterans' park. She spoke in 3 4 support of the Coral Reef Park recreational building and reported that she is in 5 support of not spending funds on the veterans' park until the Village has 6 received a deed that is free and clear.
